A PAGE FROM AN EARLY NINETEENTH CENTURY ROAD BOOK.

The page is from the 1825 edition of Paterson's Roads (by Mogg). Routes are indicated (with distances) in the centre column, with directions for left or right turn, and a warning about bridges (and though not here, the occasional turnpike gate). Places of interest along, or close to, the route are featured at the side.

The extract from an advertisement for Tanner & Baylis is from S Y Griffiths, New Historical Description of Cheltenham & its Vicinity, The Tanner family had an establishment at the Road House near 1826. the Bear Inn, Rodborough Common (as P H Fisher records), where the Niblett firm had theirs.
